Request for the summer

Please give your children opportunities to keep their maths and literacy skills going or, at the very least, avoiding them sliding backwards this summer.

You can do this, for maths, by doing real-life tasks and practice maths knowledge. Examples of real-life maths include:

- Reading the time to the 'o'clock; then half past and quarter to/past; then to the five minutes; and later to work out timings eg for cooking
- Talk about fractions and division eg when cutting up and sharing food
- Baking allows lots of maths opportunities eg estimating, weighing, counting, number operations (x,-,+ and and ratios (when scaling up a recipe)
- Addition and subtraction can be done whilst shopping
- Money when out shopping

Maths fluency can be practised through times tables chants; addition, subtraction, division and multiplication games (using number plates) on journeys, along with computer games. For literacy, every day reading to your child along with some shared reading aloud can make a big difference: building your children's vocabulary and improving reading skills. If you have a child who is reluctant to read, any reading activity is helpful eg instructions on the internet, recipes, comics, signs in the environment.

Real-life tasks to encourage writing include: emails, shopping lists, phone messages, blogs etc.

Spotlight on safeguarding

I recently attended a safeguarding conference and, with the summer holidays in a few days, I thought I would share my notes:

What are children doing nowadays online?

- Connecting (to known and unknown people): feeling a 'connection'. They feel like that they are watching a friend
- Playing: games online
- Sharing: thoughts, opinions own content, etc
- Learning
- Creating: game platforms, music and blogs, etc
- Spending time: 15 hours 18mins per week (some children are spending longer: 7-9hours per day). Most frequently through smart phones and social media.

These are just a few pieces of information about how children are online these days. Much of what they do is positive; however, there are also risks. There is an app, called **Net Aware (from NSPCC)**, which can be really useful for parents to keep up-to-date with the latest apps and how they are being used, along with some of the risks - assessed by experts. There is also lots of useful parental guidance.

Yolo is a fairly new app, which is anonymous with livestreaming, linked to snapchat. There is clearly a risk of linking to unknown adults and 'friends'! There are risks acquiring apps that allow anonymous contact. Here is a link to CBBC which tells children why it's not a good idea to load these:

Acronyms that children might use to hide what is being said from parents online/texts:

- Gokid got observers
- IDTTY: I don't talk to you
- PIR parent in room
- MIRL meet in real life
- IHML I hate my life
- KPC keeping parents clueless
- WTT want to trade pictures

I have emboldened MIRL because of its implications for children's safety.

Signs/ things to notice if something is going wrong online:

- More/less time on line
- Child is distant/upset/angry (changes in behaviour)
- Secretive behaviour
- Lots of new phone numbers without reason

If a child discloses online abuse:

- Listen
- Reassure
- Not their fault
- Don't confront the alleged abuser
- Report

Where to report:

- CEOP
- Internet watch foundation IWF

These are simply my notes, which I hope might be useful and protect your children in some small way. I've highlighted Net Aware because it may be helpful to have information about particular apps when you don't recognise the icon. You can even use the search tool and describe it eg colour
