# Message from the Head

As a school, we have decided to review our homework policy and have looked at the research evidence to inform our decisions (https://educationendowmentfoundation.org.uk/evidence-summaries/teaching-learning-toolkit/homework-primary/). With this in mind, your children will be receiving a 'Wow' book to share their successes and practice of skills at home.

We would like you to continue to hear your children read and to read to your children at home. Increasingly, we are told that bedtime stories are still enjoyed but I-pads are favoured instead. Can we encourage you to be old-fashioned and share books with your children?

By sharing stories, children's language skills develop and it can induce sleepiness before settling down at night. Electronic light produced by devices, are, however, believed to prevent normal melatonin levels from changing which can induce poor sleep patterns. So avoiding computer time in the evening may be beneficial for the whole family as well as your child!

In addition to story times and reading, we would welcome the practising of basic maths knowledge e.g. quick addition and times table recall. This can often be done on a journey whilst you and your children are trapped! Your child might want to write down their practice in their 'Wow' book to show their expertise.

Practical maths can often be done readily at home. Cooking provides lots of mathematical opportunities e.g. weighing; time; multiplying/ratios of ingredients or patterns of multiplication (buns in a tray); fractions of different shapes when cutting up foods, etc. Shopping also offers chances to do maths (adding totals, counting money and working out change). Talking about the time can help children to begin to learn how to read it and is best done little and often.

We would love to see any writing your children choose to do in the books. They might like to write about some of the high spots in their lives e.g. a sports match in which they excelled.

Rather than setting formal homework, which has a debatable impact on learning, we hope that by providing these books the children will be inspired to show us what they enjoy doing and give them a chance to embed skills.

We look forward to seeing all sorts of things being recorded in the books - photos of art work or pictures stuck in; annotated sports successes; Lego models; science experiments, etc. It will be a chance to celebrate with our children!

# 'Wow' book suggestions

Maths: photograph some home-baking and the arrays (bun tins to show multiplication) and record calculation underneath e.g. 4x6=24 or show workings out to double a recipe.

Writing: ask your child to create a shopping list, using first sounds or whole words, depending on their skills. Older children could write a blog.

DT: create a model and photograph

Art: Christmas card design

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Sports: Draw around a trophy or medal and ask your child to say (or write) how they won it or share a photograph of the activity and write why it was such fun.

On 30<sup>th</sup> November the children will all have an opportunity to fill a shoe box for a child somewhere in the world who will be given it for Christmas. These boxes, filled with goodies, which needn't be expensive, help bring joy to children across the globe whose lives are affected by war, disease, famine and disaster and for whom Christmas is nothing like our own. This is an unconditional gift of love, regardless of background or religion and makes a massive difference to the lives of innocent children in unimaginable circumstances.

In order to do this, we ask everyone to donate as many items as they can for the appeal to put in the shoe boxes. Please see the list below of do's and don'ts:

TOYS	Cuddly toys, dolls, vehicles, skipping rope, yo-yos, balls, small puzzles, musical instruments, bits of Lego	Nothing related to war or military, no guns or knives, no playing cards, no battery-operated toys, nothing sharp or fragile, no handmade or knitted stuffed toys
STATIONERY	Pens, colouring pencils, sharpener, erasers, crayons, felt pens, stamp & ink pad sets, writing pads, notebooks, colouring & picture books, solar calculators	Nothing used or damaged, no battery-operated calculators, no scissors
HYGIENE	New toothbrushes & toothpaste, bars of wrapped soap, combs, hairbrushes, flannels	No liquids or lotions including bubbles, no medicines, nothing sharp
WARMTH	Hats, caps, gloves, scarves, sunglasses,	No other clothing other than listed, no socks, nothing dirty
EDIBLE	Sweets in sealed packets – must have best before date of March 2019 or after	Chocolate, food
OTHER	Wind up torches, jewellery, hair clips	Nothing sharp or fragile

With this list in mind, we ask that you start to collect donations – either by going through the toys and bits at home, or by throwing a few extra things in your basket when you're next at the pound shop - and empty your amazing generosity into the large boxes that will be placed inside each classroom and in the lobby, from Monday 29th October and leading right up to the event on 30<sup>th</sup> November.

**PLEASE NOTE:** this is not an opportunity for fly tipping as all donations need to be new or as new and in good working order

This is a fantastic event that the children really enjoy and an emotional day for those involved - it's also a great opportunity for us all to give something back at such an important time of year.
