#### Holiday reminder

When considering both Summer and Winter holidays, please can you remember that Head teachers are not allowed to permit absences during school time, except in 'exceptional circumstances'. Principally, not much is regarded as 'exceptional', according to the rules. Do check the Absence policy on the school website, if you need clarification.

Absences during term time cause disruption to teaching as children who return from being away, have to catch up even if they have done some work whilst away. This can impact on other pupils' learning, not just the absentees.

#### Harvest

Thank you for all the gifts for our Harvest Festival. They were really welcomed by Stonepillow and make a difference to those who are homeless in the area.

Children are welcome to bring appropriate gifts from now onwards.

#### Medicines - non-prescription drugs

In the next few weeks, the school will be sending out consent forms for permission to give paracetamol (Calpol) or anti-histamine, which we are now allowed to give (for specific reasons). The Calpol will be for pain relief, rather than illnesses (except in emergencies), as children should be at home if they have a fever or temperature.

The school already give prescribed medicines but these should always have been signed for by parents with clear dosages, etc. Medicines should never be decanted into other containers and need to be with their packaging, including the leaflet with written side effects.

Most drugs don't need to be given at school but at home. The West Sussex guidance for schools states that we only give them to children if they are needed **more** than three times a day. Medication that is required less often can be given at either end of the school day.

If you need clarification of the school's medicines policy, it will be posted on the school website.

#### **Poetry Competition**

After the half-term break, we will have our annual poetry competition. Please encourage your children to learn and recite a poem (see below). Everyone is awarded house points for entry and the judges are exceptionally kind with the children.
