## Message from the Head

## IMPORTANT: contact information

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We particularly need contact information to be up-to-date in the current climate as, if your child is ill at school, we need them to be picked up rapidly. Should any child develop symptoms of coronavirus, whatever the cause, they should leave the school quickly, to protect the community and so they can be checked for COVID-19.

### Coronavirus information

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Nobody should be in school if they (or family members) have COVID-19 or symptoms. These include:

- Headaches
- A temperature
- Shortness of breath
- Loss of smell (or taste)
- Persistent cough
- Poor appetite (common in children)

We ask you to err on the side of caution, rather than come into school. 'If in doubt, don't go out!' and ring the school office to inform us.

Please avoid giving calpol to your child, prior to them coming into school, for any of the above symptoms as it may mask illness and risk cross-infection.

### Nut free

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Thank you for sticking to our nut-free rules. We have some children who are highly allergic to anything containing peanuts. Please avoid sending any products known to have nuts in them, particularly in lunchboxes. Your help is much appreciated.

### Paracetamol and anti-histamine

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Many parents have signed permissions for their children to be given either of these drugs in an emergency. Please ensure that you have agreed to their use, if you are happy to do so. **You need to let us know if your child can no longer** be given these drugs and wish to withdraw your consent, as a matter of urgency. Please contact the school office **by midday next Monday** if you wish to do this.

Please also note that we are less likely to be giving paracetamol for a child temperature as guidance suggests that children should be at home. **NO CHILD WITH A TEMPERATURE** should be sent to school.

### Open Afternoon

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This year, for obvious reasons, we won't be having a formal open afternoon. We will, however, welcome parents to 'View through the window' the week beginning 5.10.20 (or, indeed, another day).

If you know of any local families, who might be interested in joining the school, please encourage them to visit. They will be able to see the school, at work, from the outside but will need to make an appointment by email or phone ([office@harting.w-sussex.sch.uk](mailto:office@harting.w-sussex.sch.uk) or 01730 825388)

Our catchment area includes Harting and surrounding villages but we are often able to accommodate children from further afield, including Petersfield and other Hampshire locations.

There will still be some spaces available ad hoc but these need to be booked by email (to the office – see above) **by 4pm on the day beforehand**. Requests after this time are unlikely to be accommodated as the office is not manned later most days.

### 'Meet the teacher'

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We are keen to give you an opportunity to meet teachers and ask questions, if you so wish. With this in mind, we will be inviting you to a zoom meeting at some point next week to 'Meet the teacher'. There is no compulsion to join the session but you might like to hear about the new routines and ask any questions you have.

### Free School Meals

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We would be grateful if you would apply for 'free school meals', should you think you're your family circumstances might match the criteria (see below), even if your child will automatically receive them along with all other 'infant pupils'. By applying, you will help the whole school budget as there is an element of it linked to this register.

Eligibility for free school meals:

- income Support
- income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- the guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit - if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

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## Year 6 applications for secondary school

## Spotlight on safeguarding

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Information from WSCC 'Staying safe online':

### "Online gambling/loot boxes"

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Many online games for children, contain Gambling-like features that are thought to enhance the game and can appear as harmless fun, however it is important to know it can also normalise the behaviour of gambling for children and potentially lead to harmful online habits.

Loot boxes are a key feature in many online games, they offer the gamer a reward in exchange for a purchase. However, there is no guarantee that the loot box contains what the gamer requires. Therefore, this can lead to addictive purchasing, enticing the child to keep making further purchases until they get the reward they want. Often, the chances of them winning what they want are extremely small. This is especially true of loot boxes or player packs, which can cost a lot of money. For example, in Fifa, players can spend a lot in order to unlock a player that they want. It has been known for players to spend hundreds of pounds trying to get the player Ronaldo.

Huge controversy surrounds the use of Loot boxes within games as reports say that even if you are not spending real money when you are gaming, it still encourages gambling-like behaviour, which could pose a risk to children later in life. Research carried out by the Gambling Commission has outlined that children as young as 11 have been found to have problems with gambling.

It's important to be aware of our child's online activity and to look for any concerning signs:

- Your child may appear more withdrawn than usual and seem irritable and anxious
- They may experience trouble sleeping
- They may become defensive or annoyed if you ask them about any regular purchases they have made whilst online gaming.
- You may notice regular transactions for in-game purchases.
- Your child may spend excessive hours gaming and show signs of addictive behaviour.

### **What can parents do?**

- Investigate whether the games your child is playing include loot boxes.
- Turn off in-app purchases on games and make sure a credit or debit card isn't attached to the console they're playing on.

- Speak to your child and explain to them that loot boxes are designed to entice players to spend hours playing the game and spend money. Most games can still be played and completed without using loot boxes.
